

CRIMINAL JUSTICE MINOR INTERNSHIPS

Every applicant for a criminal justice minor must include **three credits of fieldwork** in a criminal justice setting.

The fieldwork must take one of the following forms. **There are no substitutions.**

- HDFS 288 Supervised Field Experience,
- INTD 210 Urban Field Studies,
- POLS 297 Supervised Field Work,
- SOCI 296 Field Experience,
- SOCI 340 Seminar in Criminal Justice (for seniors with at least a 2.6 cumulative GPA), or
- PSYC 294 Field Experience
- Students who are employed full time within a criminal justice setting may have the Group II requirement waived by their Criminal Justice Advisor when employment is documented by their supervisor.

“**In a criminal justice setting**” is a crucial phrase.

- This means that you must work in one of the institutions of the criminal justice system (e.g. the courts, prisons, probation service, police) or you work with an agency that interacts on a day-to-day basis with such criminal justice system institutions (e.g. criminal defenders, advocacy groups, education and prevention groups, others that work with juvenile and adult delinquents or at risk populations).
- If you are not certain that your proposed internship will meet the requirement of the criminal justice minor, please contact an advisor or the director.
- To satisfy its requirements, your fieldwork must be off-campus or include a substantial element of off-campus work.
- **For academic year 2007/8 on:** Any fieldwork proposed for credit in the criminal justice minor that is not entirely off-campus in a criminal justice setting must be approved in advance by one of the criminal justice minor advisors or the director.
